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ACEs and Homelessness

ACEs are common

- 87% reported at least one ACE
- Over half reported 4 or more
- ACEs predicted prior services



Implications:

Preventing ACE consequences


- Fragmented service silos vs.
 comprehensive, integrated services
- ACE-informed programs
 - Identify ACEs
 - Integrate resilience & recovery knowledge
 - Transform systems
 - Empower people
 - Whole person approach

Implications continued: Research

- Integration of ACE Study with related research
- Integrate research on prevention & intervention with ACE consequences
- ACE-informed programs
 - Team-based outcomes research
 - Multiple methodologies
- Partner with economists: cost-savings
